Rabbi's Message

The fast of Shivaa Asar Betamuz ushers in the beginning of what is known as the Three Weeks. These weeks are a period of mourning for the destruction of the Beis Hamik-

dash, and the ensuing exile that followed. We know that Chazal say that this exile, known as Galus Edom, The Roman Exile, which we are currently in, was caused by Sina'as Chinam, senseless hatred. It would seem imperative that we use this three week period to reflect upon how we can each, on a personal level, rectify this situation, which would bring about an end to this long and bitter exile. This is a challenge that we have often referred to in past messages, but is important and bears repeating often.

Shlomo HAmelech says in MIshlei ", "סוב עין הוא יברך" One who possesses a good eye is blessed". In the fifth chapter of Pirkei Avos, the Mishna says that one who is a מוב עין, warmongst other character traits, is considered a disciple of Avrohom Avinu. We can see that being a Tov Ayin is a trait that we should all aspire towards. What is this trait? And how does one go about acquiring this trait? One of the attributes of a Tov Ayin is the ability to not only not begrudge, but to actually feel happy for someone else's good fortune. How does one go about becoming a Tov Ayin? A Tov Ayin emphasizes what he has, not what he doesn't. In his commentary on this Mishna in Pirkei Avos, the CHossid Ya'avits says that the Tov Ayin has the midda of Histapkus (being satisfied with little). This does not

mean that he has no appreciation for luxury, but rather that luxury is not necessary for his

happiness. It is important to know that Hashem gives a person exactly what he needs. If a person focuses on what he has and understanding that he is given what he needs, it is easier for him to be happy for someone else's successes. What the other person has is what he needs, and what I have is what I need. Rav Moshe Rosenstein, HY"D, the mashgiach of the Lomza Yeshiva in prewar Lithuania, when giving practical advice on how to avoid the pitfalls of envy, used to say the following. What is the difference between one who has 5 million dollars, and twenty million dollars? And what is the difference between one who has 800 million, and one who has 815 million? When you get to such high numbers, the 15 million dollars is not nearly as significant as the difference between five and twenty million dollars. The difference between what we have and what our neighbors have is 15 million. Our perspective of that 15 million dollars is dependent upon where we start taking inventory. When we take all of the gifts that Hashem bestows upon us, and we don't take them for granted, rather we count them for what they are, gifts, then we are like the person who has 800 million dollars. Yes, perhaps my neighbor has 815 million dollars, but I have 800 million! Someone with a Tov Avin can be happy for someone else, so there is less enmity, less discord, and less conflict. Rather, there is more happiness and good will which leads to friendship and unity. This will ultimately bring about the final redemption.

Being in the over-50 crowd, I look at iPods, iPhones, and anything else that is wireless with some suspicion. I stared at the iPod, fumbled with the dial, and then asked the docent, "How do you work this contraption?" "It's easy," he said, and proceeded with an explanation that was more complicated than much of Mesechet Pesachim.

Just as live tour guides are fast becoming a relic of the past, so are loose-leaf binders, paper mailings, and even telephone conversations. In their place we have email, web pages, and small thumb drives that can store all of the meetings, lectures, sermons, shared recipes, and kiddush conversations that have been held at Ezras Israel for the past 100 years. As a result, the

We are also undertaking a new initiative to identify new members. Pursuant to Article XV of the by-laws, the changes were proposed in writing to the Board, and were approved by a 6-0 vote, exceeding the two-third vote requirement.

Mark Lautman, President and Mark Disler, Recording Secretary, submitted the proposed changes to the members of the Congregation for their consideration, as required by Article XV, by letter dated June 17, 2013. The Board believes the modest changes the Board is proposing are in the best interests of the Congregation and reflect current realities in the operation of the Synagogue.
