Rabbi's Message



Summer—the time of year when we all look forward to a vacation of some sort. A time when things generally slow down a bit. A time that at one time or another someone at the office might be out on vaca-

tion. A time of the year when the most serious traffic is heading into and out of the weekend. But, in the middle of the summer, we Jews we have a stop sign that suddenly appears. This sign is known as the Three Weeks, beginning with the Fast Of the Seventeenth of Tamuz and culminating on Tisha B'Av. The summer spirit is one of rest and relaxation, of decompressing from all the stress that we experience. The Three Weeks are in many ways the antithesis of this summer spirit. It is a time when we take upon ourselves various restrictions. We refrain from listening to and playing music and getting haircuts, amongst other restrictions. For the last nine days, from the beginning of the month of Av, we raise the level of mourning to include restrictions on laundering and swimming.

The word Moed conjures images of the chagim; Pesach Shavuos and Sukkos—surely not the day of Tisha B'Av. Nevertheless, Megillas Eichah refers to Tisha B'Av as a Moed (the reason why Tachanun is not recited on that day). We can understand why Pesach and the other Chagim are called "Moed"; but how do we

reconcile the concept of Tisha B'Av as a Moed? To understand this properly,

we must first define what is meant by "Moed". A Moed is a specific, appointed time. Pesach is a specific time to commemorate Yetzias Mitzrayim. Shavuos is a specific time to commemorate the giving of the Torah. Sukkos is a specific time to commemorate Hashem protecting and providing for us in the desert. Each of these Chagim are not merely commemorations or celebrations, rather, they are times for us to be inspired by the particular message that we are commemorating. Tisha B'Av, too, is a time to commemorate. It is a time to commemorate the destruction of the Beis Hamikdash. The Beis Hamikdash, which is the focal point of Jewish life, and whose destruction has left a gaping void in the Jewish Nation. The destruction of the Beis Hamikdash is why we are spread amongst the nations of the world, with all the accompanying tragedies. The Crusades, the Spanish Inquisition, and all the resulting tragedies that have befallen Klal Yisroel... They all are because of the destruction of the Beis Hamikdash. When one realizes that the Jewish Nation is not complete without the Beis Hamikdash, and what the Beis Hamikdash represents, we realize that we are so unique and so different from all the other nations of the world. We realize that we cannot fulfill our mission as a nation without the Beis Hamikdash. This is what the Moed of Tisha B'Av is. A specific appointed time to reflect upon the centrality of the Beis Hamikdash, and what its loss means to us. Leshana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim.

What could I say about shabbat that hasn't already been said? Nothing, except to describe what I observe during these long summer days.

During a recent weekend, Tamira went to West Orange, NJ, to

Spring, how to ring the stop signal on a bus, the train that passes within earshot of his house several times a day, the periodic arrival of the ice cream truck during the summer months, and other matters of import pertaining to regional transportation issues.) He certainly exhibited an ability to express the passage of time.

It is during the long shabbatot of the summer that the passage of time seems to be different. I write this during the time of year when the shabbat is the latest, starting around 8:15 and ending around 9:15. It is a wonderful time of year. After a solid nap, ending around 4:00 or so, there still is a lot of time to read books, catch up on mishnayot, take a walk, or visit with other people in the area. By the time the sun starts to set on

motzei shabbat, about 8:30, it seems as if time slows down, and there is additional opportunity to continue performing the mitzvah of resting. Later, by the time three stars appear, the bio-rhythm has adjusted, and there is really no rush to light the havdalah candle. What other nation has such as gift?

A bonus is the seudah shlishit at Ezras Israel. The reasons I rarely attend the seudah shlishit are legion, but when I do attend the atmosphere is wonderful. It is a time to hold on to the last hour or two of shabbat, and then to start the week in a formal, honorable manner. The regulars at the seudah shlishit already know all of this, of course. For those of you who haven't been to this weekly event, or who haven't attended in quite a while, the remaining weeks of the

summer is a wonderful time to give it a try.

One other item comes to mind in preparation for this newsletter. The topic of having a single regular ba'al griah (Torah reader) is, as systems engineers say, a "single point of failure." We are very thankful that R. Kreiser and his sons participate as backups, but it would be better to have two people in the rotation if not more. If there are some צדיקים נסתרים (hidden tzaddigim) who have been wanting to read more, now is the time to reveal yourselves. If you know of other people, members or visitors to our synagogue, who can read once a month, please let them know of our need.

As we move toward the fast of 9 Av and the subsequent holidays, I wish you all a wonderful remaining summer and a shanna tovah.
